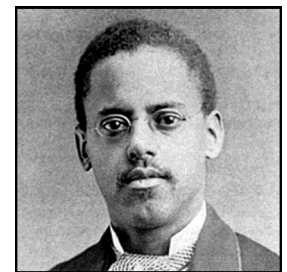


The Importance of Black History Month

A Puzzle of Cultures

When I first came to Michigan from Azerbaijan, I was seven. I was ready for a new start because I had some scary experiences in my country. I was shocked that there was so much to do, to learn, and to see. One big difference I noticed here was the roads were more comfortable to ride on because in my country there was dirt and rocks and bumps on the streets. I had to get used to new things like the taste of food, what kind of things people cared about, and how people got around. It was like fitting pieces of a puzzle together.

But I was new here and didn't speak English, only Azerbaijani and Turkish, so I couldn't do too much because I didn't understand. When I started school, that was when all the drama started. I will describe it in one word: terrible. I'm being honest. I did not like it. It was really like I was missing out and not loved because I didn't understand the language. I was too shy to talk and I always had cold lunch so I wouldn't have to talk to anyone. Only the teachers could understand me because they tried to understand my English.

When I had learned English (by watching TV and talking to my cousin who already lived in Michigan), everyone was finally not acting like I was not there. Everyone was nice to me and to each other and no one bullied one another. It was like that for third grade. I finally felt like the puzzle was fitting together.

Then I visited Azerbaijan after third grade ended, and I had to take all my puzzle pieces apart again. For example, I needed to eat less at each meal because we had four meals instead of three (we had a meal when we got ready for bed).

When I first started fourth grade I was worried no one would remember me, but everyone did. I was worried about what teacher I would have, but it was Mrs. Brenner, who is a really nice teacher. I was worried that the specials teachers weren't going to be the same, but when I went, everything was normal. It was easy to get all the puzzle pieces together again.
